Admiral William H. McRaven

Admiral William H. McRaven will be appearing for one night only—Tuesday, January 31, 2023. His appearance is part of Angel Night, a special evening for our generous Angel sponsors.

We are thrilled to present four-star Navy SEAL Admiral William H. McRaven, Commander of U.S. Special Operations Command (2011-2014); Commander of U.S. Joint Special Operations Command (2008-2011); Commander of U.S. Special Operations Command Europe and Director of NATO Special Operations Forces Coordination Centre (2006-2008). McRaven oversaw the 2011 raid in Pakistan that killed al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden. He has been involved in some of the most famous missions in recent memory, including the capture of Saddam Hussein and the rescue of Captain Richard Phillips. As the commander of U.S. Special Operations Command, McRaven led a force of 69,000 men and women and was responsible for conducting counter-terrorism operations worldwide. He is a recognized national authority on U.S. foreign policy and has advised presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama and other U.S. leaders on defense issues.

Homeboy Hero

In 1986 Father Gregory Boyle became pastor of Dolores Mission Church, the poorest Catholic parish in Los Angeles with the highest concentration of gang activity. At the time, the prevailing means to deal with gang violence was mass incarceration. But where others saw criminals, Father Boyle saw people in need of help. He popularized the radical notion that even the most demonized individuals can thrive when given a second chance. Homeboy Industries was established, creating and operating its own job training businesses and services including a bakery, café, tattoo removal, education, workforce development and more-providing a vital training ground for thousands of homeboys and homegirls. Writer and activist Marylouise "Oatsie" Oates speaks with Father Boyle about his heroic mission to serve his community.


Meet The First Female Lieutenant Governor of California—Eleni Kounalakis

Lt. Governor Eleni Kounalakis was sworn in as the 50th Lieutenant Governor of California by Governor Gavin Newsom on January 7, 2019, making her the first woman elected Lt. Governor of California. A native Californian, she visited each of the state's 58 counties during her historic campaign, beating a fellow Democrat to win the office. 


The Outlander Series: An "Accidental" Phenomenon

The book is five novels in one, each braided around the others, and each of the book's five protagonists are connected through time by a sixth novel: an ancient text about a shepherd's comical journey to a utopian city in the sky. Dedicated to "the librarians then, now, and in the years to come," *Cloud Cuckoo Land* is a paean to the extraordinary human capacity to transmit stories from generation to generation and a novel about stewardship—of books, of our shared planet and of the human heart.





How to Beat Cancer



What are the qualities that go into good listening? Most would insist on a certain degree of focus. (No phone under the table.) Patience might be part of it: a listener who doesn't jump in before you are done. And there's probably a sense of generosity, a judgment-free attitude. A good listener will take in more of what you have to communicate than a distracted one. But good listening doesn't just affect the reception of a given message. It helps shape the message itself. Think about it: if you are trying to express something personal and important, a good listener will make you feel safe to take risks. To explore nuances. Show vulnerability. The same is true in music. Performers don't just sound better in a hall with great acoustics, where the architecture highlights all the juicy overtones of their instruments. They also sound better in front of an audience that is curious, open-hearted and focused. To bring out the rich range of overtones in any human communication, you need the right social acoustics. Corinna da Fonseca-Wollheim, contributing classical music critic at The New York Times, explains how.
